As she built a thriving career in financial services at RBC, Maria also expanded her impact beyond the 9-to-5 day job, serving as a mentor, board member, advisor, and donor to countless causes close to her heart – including Big Brothers Big Sisters, Junior Achievement of Canada,

and of course, Georgian College. She even volunteers with the Georgian College Alumni Association, helping to support and mentor more than 95,000 graduates worldwide.

Maria recently cemented her legacy at her alma mater by creating the Maria Artuso Award of Empowerment in 2022. Inspired by the Women's inTUITION initiative, the award recognizes female students with financial need who contribute to their communities and excel academically.
