Thanks to the generous support of our donors, and the confidence of our government and community partners, we have taken a monumental step forward in this journey.

The landscape of health care is changing with each passing day. In emergency rooms, hospitals, clinics and long-term care homes across Ontario and throughout Bruce, Grey and Simcoe Counties, we are facing a shortage of nurses – one that has been festering for years and only intensified during the COVID-19 pandemic.

As our communities continue to grow, our population ages, and new health-care challenges arise as retirement looms for many health professionals, the need for nurses is more critical than ever. Georgian has long been known for offering quality nursing education in partnership with other postsecondary institutions, but to attract and retain these qualified nurses locally, we needed a holistic, four-year degree program in our own backyard.

Frontline Support was Georgian's solution

Launched in 2021, the campaign has helped to ensure that the next generation of nursing professionals can and will be trained close to home. The campaign has connected donors and partners to create immense opportunities for aspiring nurses in our local communities and provide a nurturing ground to build their careers right here in Central Ontario. Since the campaign's launch, donations at every level have served as the building blocks for this new program. These gifts have supported capital renovations underway on our campuses; helped to purchase advanced simulation equipment and learning technology; created scholarships, awards and bursaries to ease the financial burden for promising nursing students; and earmarked funds to conduct innovative research with impact.

The success of our *Frontline Support* campaign, and the launch of the new nursing degree program, rests first and foremost on the shoulders and immense generosity of our donors – individuals, corporations and community partners who have rallied behind Georgian's cause and share our vision for nursing education here in Bruce, Grey and Simcoe Counties. Our donors, supporters and partners have stepped up to help us raise more than \$5.4 million to date for the *Frontline Support* campaign, making it possible to launch Central Ontario's first Honours Bachelor of Science – Nursing degree program in September 2022.

Grey County

Budgeting for the future of nursing

Our government leaders are meant to inspire the community and advocate on behalf of the greatest good for the constituents they serve. Recognizing the critical shortage of nurses impacting the local health-care system in the wake of COVID-19, Grey County boldly stepped forward in October 2021 to announce \$1 million in support of capital renovations at the Owen Sound Campus.

As part of the ongoing health-care initiatives reserve fund, this contribution to the *Frontline Support* campaign is a commitment to help curb the impact of the current health-care crisis through a properly equipped and furnished nursing degree program. It was also a pledge to provide opportunities for promising local students to complete their training and start their careers close to home in Grey County, something not possible under the previous model.

"Very often, the urban hospitals that provided placement opportunities for students in the final part of their programs were able to hire them upon graduating," said Grey County Chief Administrative Officer Kim Wingrove. "This put rural communities like Grey County at a real disadvantage when competing for badly needed new registered nurses."

Reaching new heights for Frontline Support

As the largest gift to the *Frontline Support* campaign and the largest endowed gift Georgian has ever received, the Joyce Family Foundation's \$1.5-million donation signaled a game-changing moment for the Honours Bachelor of Science – Nursing degree, our future nursing students, and the future of our entire community.

Announced in April 2022, the generous donation created a permanent endowment and established a bursary program for nursing students, with four \$4,500 renewable bursaries awarded to new, full-time students each year. Students will be chosen to receive these bursaries based on financial need and evidence of overcoming obstacles and adversity in their personal or academic journeys. One of the four bursaries is also earmarked for a student who identifies with Indigenous ancestry.

This incredible level of support helps ensure financial hardship will not prevent aspiring nurses from pursuing the best possible education and reduce financial stress. The Joyce Family Foundation has become a catalyst for a stronger and more sustainable nursing talent pipeline in Bruce, Grey and Simcoe Counties.

Georgian College Golf Classic

Scoring big for the future of nursing

As Georgian's longest-running fundraiser and one of the region's largest charity golf tournaments, the Georgian College Golf Classic attracts 300 participants each year, including corporate partners, local businesses and community leaders, to help raise significant and increasing support for student awards and scholarships. And Georgian's 2022 event was no exception.

The 32nd-annual Georgian Golf Classic, presented by BMO Bank of Montreal and hosted at The Club at Bond Head, raised more than \$160,000 towards financial aid and critical funds needed for nursing students as part of the *Frontline Support* campaign. Overall sponsorship revenue also increased by 20 per cent, demonstrating the immense level of support that continues to grow for Georgian and our students with each passing year through this event.

Community philanthropists honour their mother

Nancy McCullough and Craig Wallwin knew their late mother Verdi Wallwin was very proud of graduating as a registered nurse. Throughout her life, her 1953 graduation photo hung outside her bedroom, and she kept her nursing caps neatly stored. What they didn't realize was that she'd also carefully saved so much more related to her time as a nursing student. "I found it all when I was cleaning out my parents' home," said Nancy. "There was a ring, a pin, even her shoes. She kept all her textbooks, work journals, notes and exams, the graduation program and the congratulations cards people had given her."

Almost 70 years later, Craig and Nancy, along with her husband David, honoured their mother's memory by creating an endowed entrance bursary for Georgian nursing students, funding an annual \$2,000 bursary
