our landscape

Since 1955, York has differentiated itself from other universities by enabling access to, and expanding available opportunities for, quality education. However, the scale and nature of this access has changed dramatically over the course of our nearly 60-year journey.


International students entering undergraduate programs at Canadian universities are projected to increase from 35,300 in 2014 to approximately 50,000 students by Fall 2020. University pathway programs also are expected to grow from 7,500 in 2014 to 11,400 by 2020, which represents an annual growth of 7.2% among those who have lower English scores (i.e., IELTS score of less that 5.0).


The Greater Toronto Area (GTA) and surrounding regions have transformed into a hub of multiculturalism and diversity, with a growing population of Canadian newcomers. As such, the universities across the GTA will be an attractive option for this influx of international students. These communities are ripe with aspiring professionals eager for access to higher education and career opportunities that will allow them to live and work locally.

As a centre of business and creative enterprise, Toronto also plays host to millions of professionals daily who are searching for career opportunities and advancement. This influx increases competition in the job market, amplifying the importance of ongoing higher education for those seeking long-term, sustainable opportunities and wishing to remain marketable in their careers.

In fact, the workforce itself is changing, with millennials making rapid career changes (every two years on average) and requiring programs that can be completed more quickly than those traditionally offered by university continuing education units. Many of their current jobs didn't exist when they chose their initial postsecondary programs and, as a result, existing continuing education opportunities don't match the needs of the modern workforce.

Throughout these evolutions, York has consistently developed innovative programs that allow our diverse community to access and engage with higher education. But in the face of new and substantial challenges posed by a constantly changing landscape, a more comprehensive solution is needed.





our approach

To meet the changing needs of accessible education in Toronto, the School of Continuing Studies at York University was created in November 2014. Today, it serves nearly 2,000 students annually.

The School embodies York's commitment to accessible education and supports our mission to be a leader in the field of continuing education and English academic preparation by:

- Creating cutting-edge, innovative and accessible adult education programs;
- Breaking through traditional disciplinary boundaries;
- Building 'T-shaped' professionals—those that have the balance of foundational skills for success as well as deep professional competence; and,
- Preparing international students with the language, reading, writing, speaking and academic preparation skills required to excel in university and in their career.

With its uniquely structured accelerated programs, the School propels students forward so they are better prepared to make an impact in their careers and on our world. Offerings are constantly growing to meet the demands of Canada's evolving workforce. Not only do students have access to leading-edge, contemporary programs, but they also have the flexibility to complete their studies in a method and pace that accommodates their individual needs and challenges.

The School's English Language Institute is at the forefront of creating pathways towards higher education for international students, allowing them to develop the skills they need to be successful at a Canadian university. These students are better positioned to join both the academic community and broader workforce, and also achieve a higher GPA on average than those students who do not attend the Institute.

Local GTA Market

The School enhances access to university education (at both certificate and degree levels) for those in the vital GTA market (and surrounding area), with nearly 75 per cent of the current student population originating in Toronto and across the York, Peel, Halton and Durham regions. As the population in these regions reaches more than 9 million inhabitants, the School's target market will simultaneously expand to nearly 3 million potential students.

Working Professionals & Mature Students

The School tailors its offerings to meet the needs of today's mature and working students and usher them through a seamless, comprehensive experience.

Certificates are offered in part-time, online and in-class formats, and are uniquely structured into accelerated cohorts rather than courses to foster a deeper understanding of the material, enabling students to graduate more quickly.

The degree completion pathway for working adults offers quick admission, priority registration, a guaranteed minimum completion date and advisor supports to assist from preadmission through to graduation.





N.O.W. Plus Degree Pathway

Launched in September 2015, the N.O.W. Plus Degree Pathway is an innovative approach to support working adult students in successfully completing a degree at night, online and on weekends. It includes specialized supports such as pre-admission advising, reserved spots in classes offered online or outside of traditional working hours, and agreements to ensure courses are scheduled in a way that allows these students to finish their studies at a flexible pace.



our challenge

The School of Continuing Studies fulfills York's mission of adapting to the changing needs of our communities in many ways.

Over the next five years, York has plans to continue enhancing its alternative pathways as our overall annual enrolment is expected to make a sizable and consistent jump. However, there are still substantial obstacles standing in the way of the School's long-term success and ever-expanding potential.

Due to limited available classroom and administrative space, operations are currently compartmentalized across York's Keele campus; this prevents collaboration among units and impedes our students' overall experience. The varying quality of classroom space has also made it difficult to attract students to our on-campus programs from key professional demographics.

We are expecting a substantial increase in the number of international students at lower language scores coming to Canada in search of programs like those offered at the English Language Institute. This means that our capacity to host these students is of the utmost importance to our future growth. The School has already run out of allotted classroom space in 2015, while newly acquired classrooms for 2016 have already been filled to capacity. We are in the process of acquiring even more additional classrooms for 2017, but remain at a critical juncture as demand for our English academic programs continues to surpass the additional classroom space we are able find—a demand that will certainly continue to rise.


We have already demonstrated that our unique approach to continuing education and English language pathways can meet the diverse academic and professional needs of our students. However, these constraints on space present a severe roadblock to accommodating the rising local and international markets and the compounding interest in programs.

If equipped with the proper resources—including technology-enriched infrastructure and expanded physical space—we can foster unprecedented growth for the School of Continuing Studies. This will benefit more students and move us closer to our priorities of mobilizing new ways of thinking, building stronger communities and preparing engaged global citizens.









our impact

Over the first two years of its operation, the School has established a strong, viable foundation, poised to serve current and future generations of students.

However, in the face of severe constraints on space, we are greatly limited in our ability to provide access to the rapidly expanding population of continuing education and, in particular, English academic pathways students. The School must expand to ensure that our programs are able to accommodate and service the expected rise in demand for our unique programs.

As part of Impact: The Campaign for York
University, the School of Continuing Studies
has set a \$10-million goal towards supporting
our sustained momentum through an
expansion of our existing infrastructure—a
new building with dedicated classrooms,
student spaces and office space for continuing
education and English academic preparation.

With dedicated classrooms and student spaces, this expansion would increase the number of students the School is able to support through its programs to 4,000 students per year in 2020/21 and 6,000 students per year in 2025/26. It would also increase staffing and resourcing capacity, greatly impacting our potential to develop innovative new programs and to build a wholesome, supportive academic experience for our students that is unsurpassed.

Although the additional space will help ensure that we fully meet the demands of continuing education and English academic preparation while enhancing students' ability to access both, it will also fuel the School's capacity to serve as an innovative driver for York. Our unique focus provides market feedback to York about the changing needs of our students while helping make prospective students aware of all the University has to offer them.
